Why and how does faith matter to Americans of African descent? How has faith been a form of entrapment or empowerment? In what ways does faith matter in public? This interdisciplinary seminar will explore these questions and how faith has mattered from a broad range of perspectives, tracing it from slavery to the development of independent Black churches to social movements like the Civil Rights Movement and #BlackLivesMatter. This course incorporates disciplines such as history, politics, theological studies, ethics, women and gender studies, and sociology. Classroom sessions are complemented by guest speakers and site visits (e.g., churches, faith-based civic organizations, divinity schools).
